(Continued from Page 9) charges as a grab for publicity by the Assemblyman. "I welcome an investigation into these charges," said Rev. Bennett. "They are false. I'll bet on it." repeated Rev. Bennett several times.

This week's meeting before the Board of Commissioners was the result of long standing disputes between the library district and patrons of the West Las Vegas Library and other guarters of the city. Although West Las Vegas Library patrons and employees have complained about unfair and disparate treatment based on race, complaints against the library district have been raised by both white and black citizens.

Another aspect of the controversy surrounding the library district is the amount of funds it gets and how they are used. Because of the consolidation of the library district by Hunsberger,

the library receives its money directly from sales and property taxes. Prior to 1985, the library got money from five separate sources. Because the library's money does not come from oovernment appropriation but instead directly from tax revenue, it is less accountable. The library revenue from taxes went up 120% from 1985-1992, but the library service population went up 46%, according to Assemblyman Williams who has led the fight for investigations into library practices.

Both Wilson and Hunsberger denied all charges of conflicts of interest and wrong doing. Wilson repeated several times, the PR firm had not yet received a contract from the library district. "And it was only an emergency measure." said Wilson.

The PR firm is needed, according to Wilson, because of problems of communication with the "community" (ostensibly

West Las Vegas) and the board of trustees. Wilson also said the library had no staff for this job. But the library's own organizational chart on page -ii- on the back of the title page of its June 30, 1992 annual report shows a department labeled "community relations service" under the category of Library Service Coordinators. Although a specific person may not be assigned to community relations problems: the organizational structure would seemingly eliminate the need to hire an outside consultant to do the job at \$125 per hour-a fee which if annualized on a 40-hour week would be \$260,000 a year.

Wilson said she needed a community relations consultant because she had been "shouted down" at the October 15th meeting.

"If there was ever an opportunity for the library to hire an (See Library, Page 18)
