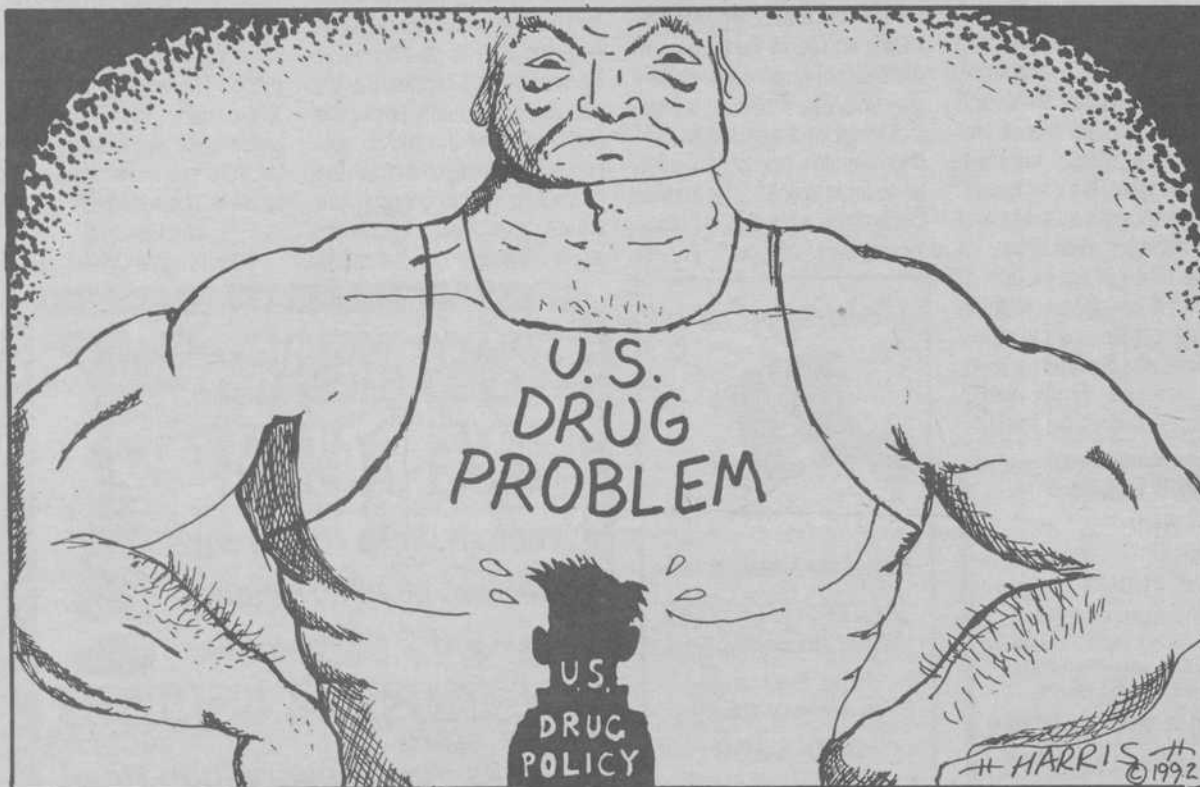

MUNICIPAL COURT, CITY OF LAS VEGAS, TRAFFIC WARRANT MORATORIUM TURNOUT DISAPPOINTING

Only 536 people took advantage of the Municipal Court's moratorium on delinquent traffic fines during the first of three Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays, leaving court officials

hoping for a better turnout this weekend.

There will not be any charge to attend the seminar and refreshments will be served.

Nine court days were scheduled to try to clear some of the 55,000 outstanding traffic warrants. Only 1,011 of the warrants were cleared in the three moratorium court days held, and Judge Seymore Brown said he was both disappointed and angry.

Judge Brown said those who did show up and those who come to this weekend's sessions will receive only minimal fines. Those who don't, face the risk of spending their holidays in jail.

"They think everybody else is going to jail and not them," Brown said. "All it takes is for them to get stopped for a taillight out and boom, the warrant pops up."

In addition to Judge Brown, Judge Ron Parraguirre, who

presides over Friday and Saturday court sessions, and Judge Valorie J. Vega, who presides over Thursday night court, will hear moratorium cases again on this Thursday, Friday and Saturday, the 10th, 11th & 12th; and next Thursday, Friday and Saturday, the 17th, 18th & 19th. Five court sessions will be held, with court check-in beginning at 7 a.m., 12 noon, 2 p.m., and 5 p.m. so people can pay their fines.

"We don't want people going to jail over the holidays," Judge Brown emphasized. "However, I want to stress that the Marshals are out making arrests on warrants on a daily basis, and I guarantee that they will be out in force arresting those people who don't take advantage of this opportunity."
