

AIDS met in Austin, Texas on December 17 for a hearing on both workplace and schoolbased HIV prevention programs, as well as how behavioral research is affecting both areas.

The hearing was the third and final in a series on HIV/AIDS prevention by the Commission, and will lead to a report to Congress and the White House next year with recommendations for a needed enhancement of the nation's HIV prevention strategies

June E. Osborn, M.D., Chairman of the Commission, in commenting on the relationship between workplace and schoolbased prevention programs, said, "I have long dreamed of a time when children returning home from effective AIDS education and prevention programs at school would be reenforced by their parents who had benefitted from equally good education programs at their workplace.

"Clearly, one of society's most important venues for effective family education is the workplace," added Dr. Osborn, who is also Dean of the School of Public Health at the University

David E. Rogers, M.D., Vice Chairman of the Commission, said the Commission also looked at the need to expand behavioral research to provide better data for prevention programs. "Behavioral research has been underfunded, discouraged and too often ignored in our national HIV prevention efforts to date." Dr. Rogers said.

"Unfortunately that lack of knowledge about basic behaviors related to HIV transmission has been reflected in vaguely worded prevention programs. We need to use all the 'intelligence' we can muster in designing future prevention efforts," added Dr. Rogers who is also Professor of Medicine at Cornell University Medical College in New York and past President of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation

Witnesses at the hearing included behavioral scientists, corporate and union leaders. professional educators and persons living with AIDS, as well as government experts on disease prevention.

The Commission also provided time for public comment.

Other services available to Seniors includes our weekly seniors clinic, which includes a physical examination and counseling regarding health and lifestyle concerns that seniors may have about their health. The program is designed to help keep seniors healthy. The examination includes height and weight check, eye exam, hearing exam, glaucoma screening, blood pressure check, urine test, blood test, and paps smear for women. Other tests are also provided upon request, but may require a fee. The examination is completed by a nurse practitioner (a registered nurse with additional training) who has been working with Seniors for a dozen years.

This clinic does require an appointment to eliminate waiting, and a \$25.00 donation is sucgested, but not required.

Services are also available for children. Well-baby check ups for children under 5 years of age are free of charge but do require an appointment. Immunizations are offered free of charge on a walk in basis. Well baby checks include counseling mothers about the stages of early development, and both physical and mental development assessment. Healthy Kid (EPSDT) services are also provided to those on SAMI under 21 years of age

In addition, the North Las Vegas Public Health Center offers family planning information and services and pregnancy verification, as well as sexually transmitted disease testing and treatment, AIDS testing and counseling. These serviced are confidential and affordable.

The North Las Vegas Public Health Center is located at 3262 Civic Center Drive, and is open from 8:00 to 4:00, Monday through Friday. For more information, call 642-3525.

Volunteers should be available 3-5 hours each week, be at least 18 years of age, and have their own transportation.


Extensive training will be provided at the Clark County Health District, beginning in September.
