found in Exodus. He too looked forward to the day when the "deathangel" would pass-over the South and set them free. The "deathangel" became the Great Civil war that eventually threw off the yoke of bondage.

The modern day Jews do not let their children forget the passover ritual and significance. This sacred period is celebrated yearly with great ceremony. In like manner, Jubilee Day for Black Americans is a type of "pass-over." It too portends of the miraculous. We believe that it was only though our suffering and the providence of God, that we were set free. Abraham Lincoln once said his aim was not to free the slaves, but to save the union. If the union could be saved, with slavery, he would keep slavery. If it could not, he would abolish the system. The High Judge of the Universe, so "arranged" events, Lincoln saw the union saved only if slavery was abolished.

It is significant, therefore, that black Americans come together once a year to celebrate their freedom from slavery.
