

UNIVERSITY OFFERS REAL ESTATE COURSE IN RENO AND LAS VEGAS

The University of Nevada, Reno is offering "Legal Primer on Nevada Real Estate Contracts" in Reno and Las Vegas.

The course will be held in Las Vegas on Wednesday, Feb. 10, at the Palace Station Hotel, 2411 W. Sahara, and in Reno on Friday, Feb. 12, at the Flamingo Hilton Reno, 255 N. Sierra St., from 8:30 a.m. - 12:30 p.m. on both days. The course fee is \$40. Four clock hours of continuing education credit are available for participants.

Contracts are the backbone of every real estate transaction and

the cause for most liability disputes for licensees.

From the new licensee to the seasoned partitioner, investor, banker or general public, this course will provide a better understanding of the legal documents used in everyday real estate practice.

A basic review of contracts is followed by an in-depth discussion of specific types of agreements encountered in real estate. A review and analysis of national and Nevada case law brings the students

face-to-face with the application of contract law.

The instructor for the course, Jerry J. Kaufman, is a former deputy district attorney in Las Vegas, and is presently an attorney and licensed real estate broker in Nevada and Utah.

CCSN PROVIDES "FAST TRACK" CULINARY ARTS COURSES FOR DISLOCATED WORKERS FROM TONOPAH TEST RANGE

LAS VEGAS - City Councilman Frank Hawkins, Chairman of the Job Training Board, has announced that the PRIVATE INDUSTRY COUNCIL unanimously approved a request from Nevada Business Services to enter into a Professional Services Contract with the Southern Nevada Community College to provide "fast-track" culinary arts courses for Dislocated Workers from the Tonopah Test Range who reside in the Southern Nevada area.

Dr. Joan Huey, the member of the Private Industry Council

who made the motion to approve the Professional Services Contract with the Community College Culinary Arts Department stated: "With the reductions at Tonopah, I felt it was critical that as many of the effected dislocated culinary workers from the Tonopah Test Range be provided additional training opportunities as possible to make them competitive in the growing Las Vegas Resort market."

Mr. David Hicks, President of Nevada Business Services said: "NBS has been working

with Mr. Mike Grenier, Business Agent for the Culinary Union and Mr. Giovanni Joe Delrosario, CCE, CEC: Chef Instructor at the Community College, to put together a course of study to upgrade the skills of those Culinary workers who are no longer working due to the layoffs at the Tonopah Test Range and in an attempt to make them more employable in the Southern

Nevada Hotel/Restaurant/Banquet business."

Community College Chef Instructor Delrosario commented: "We have put together a "fast-track" culinary arts course which provides REECO and other Dislocated Culinary Workers enhanced skills thereby allowing them to be in a better position to compete in the areas of Culinary Arts upon competi-

tion of each of the 40 hour training courses we will offer."

Hawkins concluded by stating: There are approximately 250 Dislocated Culinary Workers resulting from the layoffs at the Tonopah Test Range alone.

I feel that the actions of the Private Industry Council in approving the Professional Services Agreement with the Community College to provide addi-

tional training for many of these Dislocated Workers is a major step forward in providing the necessary technical and related culinary arts skills to these workers at this critical time of expansion and need in our Southern Nevada Resorts Industry."

Johnson named him U.S. Solicitor General in 1965 before advancing him to the Supreme Court in 1967.

In probably his most prominent case, it was Marshall, representing nine Black Little Rock, Arkansas students, that argued and won the Brown vs. Board of Education case in 1954 that declared public school segregation unconstitutional.

After his appointment to the Supreme Court he continued to fight for the rights of Blacks, but



On June 13, 1967, President Johnson announced his nomination of Marshall for the Supreme Court. He was confirmed by the Senate on August 30.

by the early 1970's he often found himself in the minority as the court grew more conservative.

A perfect example of this came in 1974 when he harshly dis-

agreed with a ruling which invalidated plans for busing students to achieve racial integration.

Marshall's failing health forced him to cancel plans to

administer the oath of office to Vice President Al Gore during last Wednesday's Presidential Inauguration.

"I've looked up to him from the day I met him, till this moment," Benjamin Hooks, executive director of the NAACP was quoted as saying. "All Americans, black and white, are beneficiaries of his work."

Marshall was 84.

Show" on radio station WBOK. This invitation propelled Gourrier into a radio career which spanned thirty years in New Orleans. Gourrier co-hosted the "Sports Parade and Stars of Tomorrow Show" for five years, before becoming a full-time radio announcer and host of the history-making "Sounds of Jazz" program on WBOK.

While working in the sports department at WBOK, Gourrier served as a play-by-play announcer and color analyst for high school football, basketball and baseball games. He worked as a ring announcer for the Louisiana State Athletics Commission. He served as president of the Crescent City Quarterback Club and is a charter member of the National Sports Foundation. In his spare time, he coached Little League Football and baseball in the New Orleans Recreation Department.
