Duane and Donald are in the second grade and are in special



education classes. A single or two-parent family of similar ethnic heritage is preferred. The boys will require a large amount of attention, structure and assistance with school work.

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

Xavier University in 1966 with a degree in Elementary Education. He began a teaching career at Carver Junior High School and was selected "Teacher of the Year" at Carver in 1970. In 1975, he received a Masters Degree in Urban Education from Xavier University. In 1980, he became principal of the Judah P. Benjamin Elementary School in New Orleans, Louisiana.

In 1985, Gourrier received his Doctorate of Education from Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tennessee. Three years later, he was recruited by the Clark County School District of Las Vegas, Nevada, to serve as the principal of the Lois Craig Elementary School, That same year, the oldest of Gourrier's seven children was graduated from West Point Academy. He also has a daughter who is a graduate of Southeastern University and a son who is presently an honor-student in his Junior year at Xavier University.

His four younger children live with he and his wife, the former Beverly Webb, of Natchez, Mississippi. In November, of 1992, Gourrier was inducted into the Clark County School District's "Hall of Fame" for his outstanding leadership in the field of education and community service. He restructured his school to become the first primary

school in the State of Nevada, servicing children three years-of-age through third grade exclusively. He serves on the Board of Directors of the PTA, the Red Cross, Boy Scouts, Safekey and other organizations. As previously stated, he was the Founder-President of the African American Summit Committee, and founder of the Black Cultural Awareness Society of Southern Nevada.

In 1991, Gourrier established the Lois Craig Mustang Track Club in his school. The first year, Gourrier, who is an assistant coach, worked with one of his students who advanced to the finals in the United States Junior Olympics. This year, his track team sent two girls to the finals of the Junior Olympics. For his leadership and support of youth in the community, Gourrier was selected "Man of the Year" in 1992 by the National Sports Foundation.
