In a clash with their Sunrise Division foe Chaparral Cowboys, host Eldorado managed to escape the sloppily played contest with a 67-57 victory

Senior forward Marcus Wade tossed in 18 points while hauling down 11 rebounds, helping the Sundevils raise their record to 6-0 in the conference. Chaparral fell to 5-1.

Eldorado was off and running from the opening tip and never trailed, looking like a first-place squad, while opening up a 16-point advantage over the Cowboys at the end of the first quarter.

The second quarter looked completely opposite as the Cowboys dug in their spurs and outscored the 'Devils 19-4 to close within one point with a little over a minute left in the half. Clutch shooting and tenacious defense kept the lead within reach, as the two teams went into the locker room with Eldog leading 33-29.

Eldorado continued to look lost, as turnovers plagued their chance to pull away, while allowing Chaparral to once again pull within a point. The 'Devils were cold from the field and could not seem to shake Chap's press. Unfortunately, Chaparral couldn't

capitalize on Eldog's mistakes and they ended up down by six with one period left.

As the fourth period began, the 'Devils regained form and went on a 14-6 tear to open up a 60-46 lead.

Jarmica Reese hit for 18 points, and Dion Washington pulled 8 off the glass in the losing cause.

In other matchups Tuesday: Clark High School pulled off a 71-64 upset of the Gaels at Bishop Gorman. Troy Larkins and Kevin Bell led the Chargers' fourth quarter attack; With six seconds remaining in the contest, Mike McDougal canned two free throws to lift Valley to a 58-57 victory over Basic; In another close win, Cheyenne toppled Western 96-93, as Prep All-American Chancellor Davis hit two free throws with five seconds left in the game. Cheyenne raised their record to 6-0 in league play, while capturing their 20th victory of the season; The Rancho Rams had a fairly easy time with Vo-Tech, topping the Roadrunners 74-35; Entering the contest with an average of 19.6 points per game, Las Vegas High star Kenyatta Clyde was limited to two points, as Cimarron stymied the Wildcats 69-43.

Grambling State University was named SBN Black College National Champions as legendary head coach Eddie Robinson led the Tigers to a 10-2 record with a 45-15 win over Florida A&M in the Heritage Bowl

The first black college football game was played on December 27, 1892 between Biddle, now known as Johnson C. Smith and Livingston.




Aggies.
