BLACK HISTORY MONTH 4-PART

The recent release of the movie "Malcolm X" has renewed interest in the controversial leader and most recent American icon, but it left unanswered questions about the circumstances of the fiery orator's death in 1965

Tony Brown's Journal will offer answers to these questions as a part of its 25-year investigation in a four-part Black History Month Special during the month of February on PBS.

Circumstances surrounding the trial, the assassination itself, accounts in the press and subsequent official actions were so peculiar, that to this day, many questions are still unanswered.

Did the police arrest a second man at the scene of Malcolm X's murder, as reported by the New York papers?

Was he the thin lipped, oliveskinned man who Malcolm said followed him in Africa?

Why did the prosecutor fail to call the witness who told him he saw the confessed killer of Malcolm X and the Muslims' national secretary together the night before Malcolm X was assassinated?

Does Minister Louis Farra-

khan, known in 1965 as Louis X, feel the he contributed to a climate that made Malcolm's death a fait accompli? Was "the best administrative mind," in the Nation of Islam "a

former FBI agent," as author Louis Lomax claimed, and did a FBI memo tacitly admit that its man was running the Black Muslim group when Malcolm was

The alleged motive for the Nation of Islam to kill Malcolm X was the charge he made against Elijah Muhammad of sexual corruption.

Denzel Washington portrays Malcolm X in scenes from the award-winning Off-Broadway play "When The Chickens Came Home To Roost" in which he confronts his mentor over these charges.

Washington's first role as Malcolm X was in this 1981 production which dramatized the pivotal philosophical confrontation between the leader of the Black Muslims and his spokesman. Chickens is an electrifying saga about their split.
