Amidst charges that some members were not allowed to vote and ballots were not counted properly, the national office of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), Wednesday, ordered its Las Vegas chapter to hold a new presidential election. No information on when or where the new election would take place was available at Sentinel-Voice press time.

On December 20, 1992, Rev. Jesse Scott was re-elected president of the local chapter for his fourth consecutive 2-year term, in an election surrounded by controversy.

Scott's opponents, Mrs. Joanna Wesley-Lee and Byron Goynes, immediately protested the election procedures, and filed a formal complaint with the organization's national headquarters. The list of complaints included: 1. Candidates didn't have same access to NAACP membership list as the incumbent president; 2. Candidates didn't have access to national list with names of new members; 3. Names of new members registered by November 20 deadline were not recorded; 4. New members with receipts had to cast
