
NATIONAL ALLIANCE AGAINST RACIST & POLITICAL REPRESSION



"Isn't he cute," the mother remarked as her 5-year-old son danced up a storm in front of an admiring group of adults. "He sure is" said a bystander. "That little boy can certainly dance!" "Go 'head, go 'head," declared the enthusiastic crowd of onlookers as the little boy deftly pirouetted across the floor to the Arrested Development's "Mr Wendall."

Sound familiar? This describes a group of Black adults giving positive reinforcement to a child for being a good dancer. It's a familiar scene in any number of Black households. Little wonder why the stereotype is that African-American parents are more interested in their children dancing than excelling academically.

Dance is such a supreme art form in Black communities that the time and effort expended to master it many times greatly exceeds study time. Blacks may be more prone to heap praise on children who dance well than they do on those who read, write or excel in mathematics.

Don't get me wrong. I'm not against dancing. Dance is an Afrocentric art form which captures the rhythmic sense of our roots. As an African people, dance and rhythm are outward manifestations of our culture and the very essence of our people.

However, the tendency among us to elevate dance, along with music, to such a high priority takes away from the potential success we could achieve by focusing on the mastery of necessary life-long social and educational skills.

That's why I applaud such ventures as KCEP's "A-Team." Under the program, students who bring their 'A' papers from school with a teacher's signature are eligible to receive special prizes from the radio station. This is an excellent example of marketing academic success in much the same manner that advertisers market their products to make money. In this case, the reward is educational.

To give our kids a competitive edge when it comes to education, we've got to get on the ball! One of the most unusual ways I've heard of to inspire students educationally is used by the Reverend Johnny Ray Youngblood. Rev. Youngblood is pastor of St. Paul Community Baptist Church in Brooklyn, New York. Can you believe he actually announces students' SAT scores from the pulpit? This is a unique affirmation of the value of knowledge and education to African-American students.

Our youth, like young people of all races, need positive reinforcement, especially when they excel in their studies.
