NEW NAACP ELECTION SLATED FOR MARCH 21

As a result of the complaint filed against the Las Vegas branch of the NAACP and its December 1992 election of officers, the National Board of Directors has ordered the new election be held on Sunday, March 21, 1993, according to William H. Penn, Sr., National Director of Branch and Field Services. Penn has been appointed presiding officer and will oversee the new election.

In the first election, Rev. Jesse Scott defeated Joanna Wesley-Lee and Byron Goynes 217 votes to 109 and 87, respectively.

The election was challenged by both Wesley-Lee and Goynes who complained that some voters who had paid

their dues — making them eligible to vote — were not permitted to, that there were irregularities in the counting of the election ballots, and that the challengers were denied equal access to the branch's official list of eligible voters. Wesley-Lee then gathered the necessary 25 signatures of eligible voters who also wished to challenge the election, thus making the complaint official, and prompting further investigation.

After the decision for the new election was announced last week, Wesley-Lee and Goynes met to discuss the possibility of having only one of the two run against Scott. However, each have now announced their plans to run for the
