

AN INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY CELEBRATION

On Saturday, March 6, 1993, Las Vegas will experience its first annual Womyn's* Festival. The Festival, which is free and open to the public, will be at UNLV's Valerie Pida Plaza outside the Moyer Student Union from 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

The Womyn's Festival is a celebration of women in recognition of International Women's Day. The Festival will offer workshops, children's activities, speakers, vendors, informational booths and performances by, for and about women. It will be a day of education and entertainment intended to draw attendance from all sectors of the southern Nevada community.

The workshops, which do not require pre-registration, touch on a broad spectrum of topics of interest to women, from Journal Writing to Creative Financing & Real Estate Investment to Single Parenting in the '90s.

Parents are encouraged to bring their children to participate in the exciting children's activities at the Festival. A workshop on Jazz Dance for Children will be held from 9:30 to 10:30. All-day activities for children, in a supervised child care area, will include face-painting and a clay workshop taught by UNLV art students as well as games and play.

Additionally, Nevada women political figures and women political candidates will speak at the Festival.

While the Womyn's Festival is intended to be informative, we

also plan to entertain. Local dance and musical groups made up of women will perform at different times throughout the day. The Fern Adair Conservatory of the Arts, Ribbons & Straw Bluegrass Band, Simba and Rafiki Girls dance troupes, blues singer

Arlene Cherry and the Lady J and Friends jazz band are among the fine performers scheduled to highlight the Womyn's Festival.

The Womyn's Festival will be a chance for all community members — women and men, girls and boys — to learn more

about a diverse range of opportunities, services and products for women in our area and to enjoy an activity-filled day. Bring a picnic lunch and join us for the day!

The Nevada National Teen-Ager Program is the Official State Finals to the 22nd Annual National Teen-Ager Program to be held at Opryland USA, with a television quality production, on July 25-31, 1993.

There will be a State Winner and 4 Runners-up in two age divisions: 13, 14, 15 and 16, 17, 18. The Winner in each age division will receive a \$1,000 Savings Bond, a trip to Opryland USA, and a Full-Tuition Modeling Scholarship from John Robert Powers, worth \$1,000.

The 1992 National Teen-Ager, Dana Stephenson of North Carolina, received a \$10,000 cash scholarship, plus \$20,000 in tuition scholarships. LaTara Reber is our Nevada Junior National Teen-Ager. Beth Troutman, our Junior National Teen-Ager, received a \$5,000 cash scholarship. Both National Winners will also enjoy a year of travel, including Hawaii, Mike Benet wardrobe, cosmetics, jewelry and many other prizes.

Each contestant accepted has the option to participate in the Volunteer Community Service Program of America's National Teen-Ager. This program teaches teenagers to share and to participate in school and civic activities. Contestants will be

may be presented at the option of the participant or an oral essay on the subject of "What's Right About America."
