For years New Orleans, Louisiana has been a mecca for blacks; a place of employment opportunities. New Orleans is a charming city full of fine restaurants, dinner theaters, sports, universities, and most of all, music. Everyone owes themselves at least one trip to the Mardi Gras or the annual Jazz and Heritage Festival, not to mention various other activities throughout the year. However, one attraction which is a must see, a living testimonial to black history, is Preservation Hall.

Preservation Hall on St. Pe-

ter Street in the Quarter was started in the nineteen fifties by Ken Mills and Barbara Reid to give the older black musicians a place to play. Most of the young musicians were going the way of modern jazz and blues and were playing in the joints that catered to the tourists. The older musicians were crowded out by strip joints, gift shops and other modern tourist traps. Presently a few younger musicians are beginning to creep into the bands but only after it is established that they thoroughly understand traditional jazz.
