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turns to the Sweet 16 for the first time since 1989.

Finishing their second round game against St. Johns on a 24-8 run, Arkansas extended their season with a berth to the Sweet 16 with an 80-74 victory over the Redmen.

Nolan Richardson's Razorbacks pulled off an amazing comeback to return to the regionals for the third time in four years. The one problem with Arkansas will be the team that they have in front of them - North Carolina.

The Tarheels have destroyed their first two opponents, East Carolina and Rhode Island, by an average of 32.5 points. The top-seeded Tarheels advanced to the Sweet 16 for the 13th straight season. Their 112-67 victory last Sunday over R.I. upped their record to 30-4, as they reached the 30-win mark for the first time since 1987. The combination of Derrick Phelps and Eric Montross will carry this team right to the championship game.

The final two matchups, out of the West Region, finds last year's runner-up Michigan facing George Washington and Vanderbilt up against Temple.

12th-seeded Geo. Washington surprised many by stunning New Mexico in the opening round. The Colonials received a big break when 13th-seeded Southern upset 4th-seeded Georgia Tech to advance to the second round. Southern's motivational play that was displayed against the Yellow Jackets in Round One, didn't carry over as the Colonials eliminated the Jaguars 90-80. George Washington remains the lowest seeded team left in the tournament.

Michigan, which is coming off of an overtime thriller against UCLA, will be led by All-American Chris Webber, who scored 27 points and 14 rebounds in the Wolverines' 86-84 victory. The Colonials may have some 'cinderella inspirations' on their minds, but a victory over these hungry pack of Wolves is unlikely. Not to stress the same point as LSU Coach Dale Brown, who said "California didn't have a prayer against Duke," but we're talking about a team that has carried a year of animosity around following their humbling defeat to the Blue Devils in last year's final.

Vanderbilt and Temple bring together two teams who quietly and modestly have succeeded through the season. Third-seeded Vanderbilt started opening eyes by remaining tough through the second half of the season. The Commodores got the #3 seed and has done an excellent job of living up to that status. Arizona looked to be Vandy's only threat on the way to the regional finals, but the Wildcats were eliminated by Santa Clara in the first round. Temple promptly eliminated the Broncos last Saturday 68-57. The Owls were led by junior Aaron McKie who poured in 25 points.

Unless the Owls can stop Vandy's offensive threat Billy McCaffrey, the Commodores and Wolverines will be squaring off Sunday afternoon for a berth to the Final Four.

MAKES NATIONAL DEBUT**



A new national golf magazine for African-American golfers has made its debut and seems to be on its way to success. Clovis Campbell, Jr., Vice-President in charge of advertising for the Arizona Informant Newspaper, is the publisher of LINKS, named by the Campbell Publishing Company.

"LINKS is the first of its kind that is targeted to the African-American golfer," explained Campbell. "With over 700,000 Black golfers in the United States, our goal is to reach them through LINKS



magazine. We feel that a 350,000 paid circulation is within our goal." Campbell said he has over 50,000 names and addresses of Black golfers in the computer.

"In the near future we feel that we will have a work force of 250 potential employees to publish and distribute the magazine. For the first year we will only publish LINKS magazine quarterly."
