LEGISLATIVE UPDATE COLLEGES NOT IMMUNE DEMIC SUCC

Five major bills introduced last week in the Legislature have caused a lot of controversy in the eyes of universities, NCAA officials, university foundation representatives, and sport fans alike. Assembly bills 399, 400, 401, 402, and 403 were introduced and referred to the education committee for testimony

AB 399 would regulate university foundations that make donations to universities and certain agencies and departments within the universities to report to the board of regents their donations under certain circumstances. These disclosures and reports would state which donations are being given, to whom, for what purpose, and what amount.

ISSUE APPROVE

university foundations to pay tax on transfers of real property and prohibit an employee or officer of the University of Nevada System to accept employment or compensation from a university foundation. The bill also states that an employee or officer of the University of Nevada System can not serve as a member of the governing body of an university foundation.

AB401 enforces the board of AB 400 further regulates regents to approve certain con-

tracts of employment, agreements of compensation and agreements with independent attorneys.

The bill would also change provisions for the board of regents to require the approval of the president of a university or community college to conduct certain undercover investigations and providing penalties.

AB 402, introduced by Chairman of Education Wendell Williams (D-Distrist 6), is a legislative matter that supports the university system's rules and regulations that require a university student who participates as a member of varsity athletics to make satisfactory progress toward obtaining a degree.

AB 403 would prohibit any state agency employee, including university and community colleges, from disclosing to the public certain allegations relating to former employees without notifying the employee.

in lieu of recent scandals surrounding the UNLV basketball program. Former basketball coach Jerry Tarkanian was in constant battle with the NCAA in allegations of broken rules of the NCAA by-laws. UNLV's recent controversy includes J.R. Rider who was accused of having an English tutor complete a paper that would keep him eligible to

UNLV is not the only school

that has had run ins with the NCAA. UNR had passed actions taken in both the basketball and football programs. Newly appointed NCAA president Joe Crowley (who is also the President of UNR) ensures that all NCAA rules and regulations are abided.

How does UNLV and UNR rate in the graduation rate of student athletes? This is a question that Assemblyman Wendell Williams has asked. Both institutions rate poorly in their overall graduation rate of student athletes.

Disturbed by his findings, Assemblyman Williams introduced legislation that would require either universities or the board or regents (or both) to ensure that student athletes are 'on track' of receiving their degrees. In other words, student athletes would not be allowed to take courses just for the sake of keeping eligible if those courses don't match the academic track

The other controversy is over whether private university foundations should have to report to the board of regents their donations to the universities. University foundations generally pay for many of the fringe benefits that student athletes and coaches receive. Some foundations give scholarships. Others may pay for apartments, cars, clothes, or donate complimentary services such as rooms and shows on the Strip.

AB 402 will be heard in Las Vegas on April 14th along with tentatively scheduled AB 399, and AB 400. The hearing will take place at the Cashman Field Complex.
