"What do we want?" "Justice!" "When do we want it?" "Now!" These words rang out loud and clear on Saturday, April 17, as concerned citizens and community leaders held a "Unity March" beginning at Main Street and Washington Avenue, through downtown to Fremont, culminating with a rally on the steps of the Las Vegas City Hall.

Nearly 150 people participated in the march, as onlookers and tourists joined the marchers as it progressed towards City Hall.

Leading the marchers were Joanna Wesley-Lee, Rev. Chester Richardson, Rev. James Rogers, Pastor, Greater New Jerusalem Baptist Church, member of Community Peace, Sgt. Wingett, Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Depart-

ment, and Assemblyman Wendell Williams, just to name a few.

The unity march songs could be heard echoing downtown as the marchers reached the strip while photographers, and television news crews followed the marchers along the route as Las Vegas Metropolitan Police support crews escorted the marchers with motorcycle and squad car units, while a helicopter unit watched from the air.

It was a sight to see, particularly in light of the fact that nearly ten uniformed off-duty officers could be seen in the ranks with marchers linked armin-arm and hand-in-hand.

Appearances at UNLV by author Henry Louis Gates have been postponed until May 3.

Gates, author of such books as "Loose Cannons: Notes on the Culture Wars" and "The Signifying Monkey: A Theory of Afro-American Literary Criticism," originally had been scheduled to speak April 1 and 2.

Gates postponed his speaking engagements because of a scheduling conflict related to his being chosen to receive a national award, said Christopher Hudgins, chairman of UNLV's English department.

The new schedule calls for Gates to speak at UNLV twice on May 3.

The main event will take place at 7:30 p.m. in the Hendrix Education Auditorium when he will speak on the topic "Beyond the Culture Wars."

Earlier in the day he will meet with students and faculty for an informal discussion session. That is set for 2:30 p.m. in Frank and Estella Beam Hall, Room 242.

The 1993 Western Regional Conference comes one year after the riots sparked by the Rodney King verdict in Los Angeles. Though two of the officers accused have been found guilty, we are still confronted by this troubling issue and our shared concern about it's volatility. The conference is envisioned as an opportunity to examine the roles and responsibilities of broadcast and print media in coverage of issues critical to the healing process. To fulfill this goal, the NABJ has invited key representatives from the media, corporate, civic and private sectors, and elected officials (local, regional and national) to join us.
