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adding "they're (City Attorney's Office) refraining from releasing any details as to the reason for the dismissal."

Tate, joined by local NAACP President, Jesse Scott, and Alzora B. Winder, attorney for Stanley Johnson, the 10 year old elementary school student who was arrested by Metro Police officers in his classroom for threatening another student, still plans to file a complaint in response to last year's incidents.

"We have been taking a wait-and-see attitude as to the refiling of charges against Dr. Tate," said Attorney Winder. "we will now continue our complaint against various governmental entities, and we expect those to be filed within a week or so."

The Metropolitan Police Department and the City of Las Vegas are expected to be named in the suit.

Addressing 10-year-old Stanley Johnson, who will be on trial next Tuesday, May 4, at Clark County Juvenile Court, Winder stated that a case of this nature is not usually proceeded on at this level. "If he were an adult, the case would be far more serious. But because he is a juvenile, I am not at liberty to address the case," she said.

"All African-American males are targets. It doesn't seem to matter how old or how young you are," Tate went on to say. "He was convicted before the trial began," Rev. Scott added.

Tate, recently named a local "Unsung Hero" by the local chapter of the National Association of Black Journalists during their Western Regional Conference last week, plans to continue his quest to establish a civilian control board to oversee the Metropolitan Police Dept..

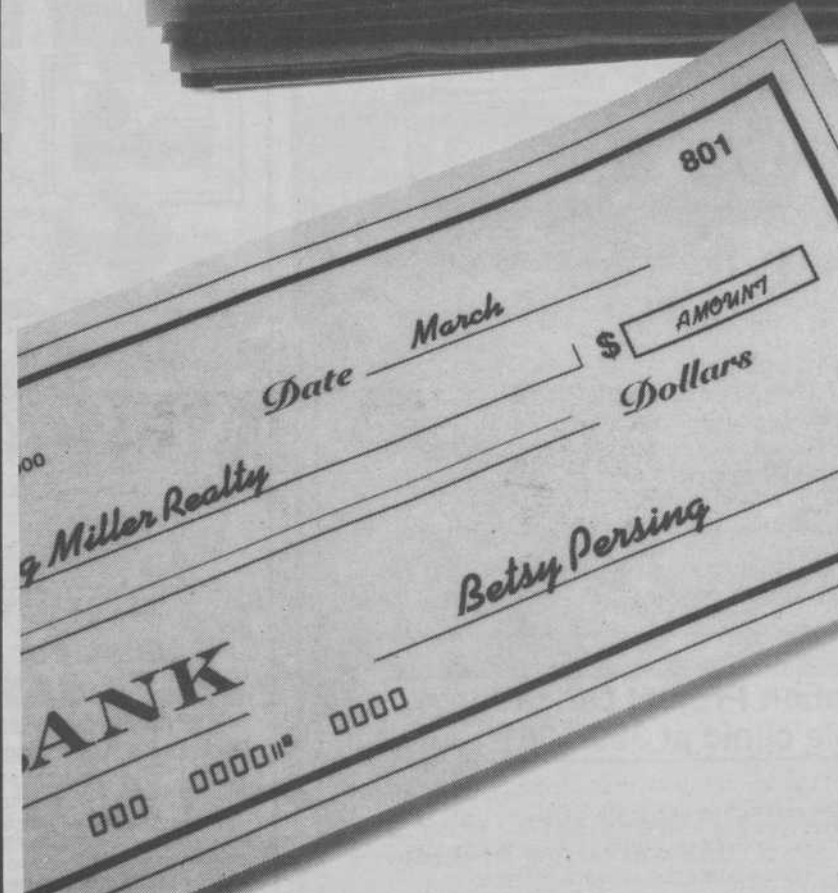
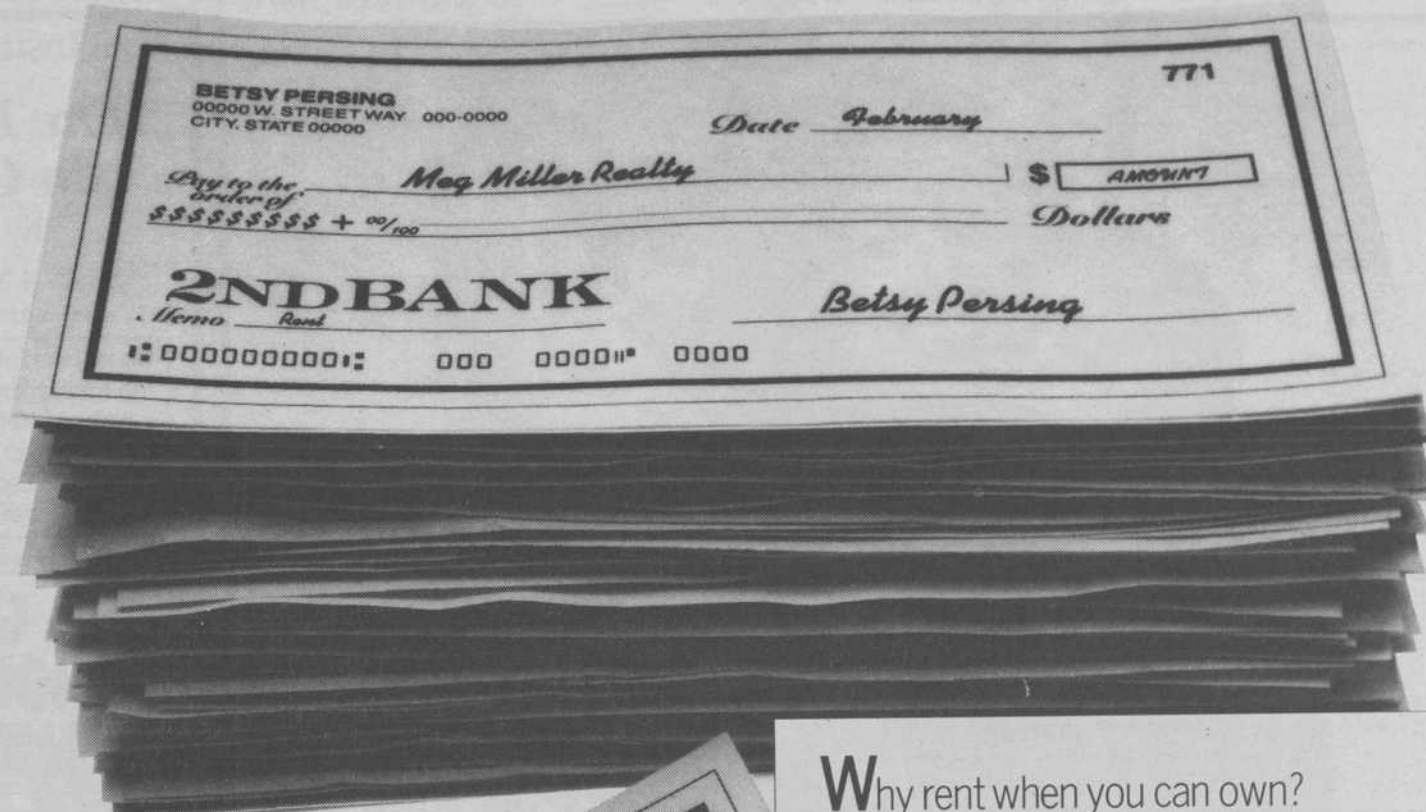
