

grades eight and 11 for the 1992-93 school year remain stable from the previous year and are above the national average. In addition, performance in the three tested subject areas is above ability at both grade lev-

Students were tested last fall with the SRA Survey of Basic Skills, a series of standardized tests used to measure student achievement in reading, math and language in relation to national norms. Students are also tested on ability.

Clark County eighth graders showed a one percentile im-

provement in reading, while 11th graders showed a one percentile decline in language, according to test scores released recently. Eleventh graders also showed a one percentile decline in ability.

"The slight changes mean very little in terms of student achievement," said Judy Costa, district testing director. "Essentially, it means we are holding steady. Given the continued influx of new students, the increase in the number of second language students and other changing demographics of our community that can effect student achievement, we're very pleased

Thirty-five years after it first a 45-minute presentation on bike opened, Tom Williams Elementary School finally will be officially dedicated with a day-long celebration Friday, May 7.

The celebration, a project of the school's 1992-93 Gifted and talented Educated class, begins at 9:30 a.m. and concludes at 8 p.m. All events will be held at the school, 3000 E. Tonopahin North Las Vegas.

The day's activities begin with a Flight for Life helicopter landing at 9:30 a.m. Also, present to talk to students will be representatives of Mercy Ambulance, the Thunderbirds and the North Las Vegas Fire department.

The fire department demonstration will include a talking robot. A 10:30 a.m. outdoor assembly will feature an oral history of the school by GATE students and several songs by the honor choir. At 11 a.m., the Metro Police bike patrol will hold safety, and the metro canine unit will conduct a demonstration at

That evening, from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m., an estimated 700 people associated with the school will gather for a lasagne dinner and the dedication ceremony. A bronze plaque with a brief history of the school will be presented as part of the ceremony. The Nellis Air Force base color guard will be present, and the Thunderbirds will return. The school also will receive new state and national flags which have flown over their perspective capitols.

In the course of their studies, students learned that the school is named for Tom Williams. founder of North Las Vegas. In incorporating the new community, he established two school sites, including the one named in his honor.

Eighth graders increased from the 53rd percentile to the 54th percentile in reading, while 11th graders declined from the 57th percentile to the 56th percentile in language. Eleventh grade ability scores dropped from the 50th to the 49th percen-

All other scores remained stable: eighth grade ability, 51st

percentile; eighth grade math, 60th percentile; eighth grade language, 55th percentile; 11th grade reading, 54th percentile; and 11th grade math, 63rd per-

The national average is the 50th percentile. Scores are reported using the mean percentile rank, the percentile equal to the average score of all the students taking the test.

# GH SCHOOL P

The original Las Vegas High School will host a communitywide open house Wednesday, May 12, before it relocates to a new building for the 1993-94 school year

The open house, from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m., will allow alumni and other members of the public an opportunity to reminisce and take one last look at the familiar halls of Las Vegas High School, the city's high school from which a number of prominent citizens graduated. The schools main hall and gym, which date back 63 years, are listed on the National Register of Historic Places, and the building's front is famous for it's art deco style.

Las Vegas High School is moving from it's current location at 315 S. Seventh Street in downtown Las Vegas to a new building at 6500 E. Sahara. That building at first was named Winchester High School, but the Board of School Trustees decided during secondary zoning to relocate Las Vegas High School to the new building and retain the Las Vegas High School name. Staff and students will be transferred to the new building.

Meanwhile, the existing Las Vegas High School building will become the Las Vegas Academy of International Studies and Performing Arts, home of two new secondary magnet programs that will be offered beginning this August.

Alumni, friends and anyone else interested in visiting the school one last time are invited to the open house. Refreshments will be served in the cafeteria.
