To apply for the scholarships,
a student must provide the following information, typed or
clearly printed, in the order given:

- Name (last, first, middle nitial);
- Address and telephone number (including area code);
- High School name, address, and telephone number.

Students must also provide, if applicable:

 A list of activities in which the student participates, such as music, sports, club, or student government:

A list of community activities in which the student has participated (must include the name of the organization, nature of activity, and list of any offices or leadership positions held in the organization;

(Students must include dates for all activities and all offices or leadership positions held.)

- A list of any awards earned in or out of high school;
- Employer's name, address, and telephone number (including job title, brief job description, number of hours worked per week, and a list of reponsibilities).
