According to Watson, the Consortium has been actively pursuing every angle possible to respond to preliminary site location and other concerns that the firm has requested.

"This would be a win/win situation for the manufacturing firm and for Las Vegas. We have been responding to whatever concerns the firm has requested and it is our hope that they locate the plant in West Las Vegas because we need jobs and we have many test site workers that have the technical skills necessary to be an asset to the plant," Watson said.

The production of these vehicles is not for domestic consumption. These automobiles will be produced here or elsewhere and then shipped to Germany where they will then be sold. The plant, if located here, will cut down on production costs, overhead, taxes and will be provided with a competitive labor-force comprised of technically skilled, semi-skilled and some unskilled workers," he said.

More than 300 teen-agers and young adults turned out Saturday, May 22 for Nevada Partners job readiness workshops.

The workshops were designed to teach young people how to look for work including how to dress, present themselves to potential employers, and conduct themselves in interviews.

Mujahid Ramadan, executive director of Nevada Partners, said "This is very encouraging. We think that 65 to 70 percent (of the participants) are up to speed. We feel that we will place all 500.

The workshops featured several speakers who shared experiences with the groups and gave them advice for landing a job.

Eric White, regional trainer for Cities In Schools, was one of the speakers. "I think it's fantastic," said White. "I like the fact that people are telling them what to do. We so often assume that they know

what to do. I like the fact that we are teaching the inherit value of working."

Joycelyn Oats, coordinator for Nevada Partners summer program, said that the sessions were designed to teach discipline and responsibility.

"We purposely set these sessions

for 8:00 in the morning. Some made it on time ... some didn't. But these office jobs start at 8 o'clock and they've got to be on time," Oats said.
