"I would like to congratulate the staff and the volunteers on the high quality of the literacy program," said Bonnie Bryan, in a letter addressing the attendees, "Your retention rate of 67%, which is above the national norm for literacy programs, is due to your commitment and dedicated efforts. This not only enriches our community, but our own individual lives as well." According to 1990 Nevada Literacy Coalition statistics, approximately 10.3% of the Clark County population is functionally illiterate which means that over 76,000 people in Clark County are unable to read job notices, shop, fill out job applications, write a check or read a medicine bottle.

"The Literacy problem in this country is very serious," said

Schwahn, "and it affects all of us by possible increases in health care costs, automobile insurance costs, on the job accidents and high unemployment."

A University of Texas study concluded that a person must read at a 6th grade level to read a driver's license test, an 8th grade level to read directions on a TV dinner or file taxes, a 10th grade level to red a label on an aspirin bottle, and a 12th grade level to read an insurance policy.
