• Chronic pelvic pain. · Painful periods, especially when disabling and/or increasing in severity. • Repeated miscarriages.

• Deep pain with sexual intercourse

Chronic fatigue. · Low resistance to infections

• Heavy or irregular bleeding or spotting be-tween periods.



Women of all ages and races should be alert to the symptoms of endometriosis, medical experts agree. March 21 to 27, 1993 and a leader in endometriosis education, support and research. Endometriosis cannot

be confirmed in routine gynecologic exams, but it can be diagnosed with proper tests and treated-the sooner the better. Treatment options include surgery to remove the endometrial growths; hormone treatments which can cause the disease to regress; and the use of pain medications. When extremely disabling and/or when all else fails, hysterectomy with removal of the ovaries is commonly suggested.
