I am delighted to inform you that FM 88.1 will be the official welcoming station for this event, which by the way is about time KCEP got it's props from local promoters, various groups, management, and record companies. Let's hope this is the start of a great collaboration for all parties involved.

So Cat, what's new on the jazz scene right now, you may ask? Well dig this!! The last week in May and the first two weeks of June at least thirteen new releases have come to my mailbox. For example; Wilton Felder has a new release, which was well overdue, entitled "Forever, Always" on PAR Records, and is a fine CD to add to your library. There are some great tunes here; each one holds it's own. However, take notice of Forever with lead vocals provided by Bobby Womack. Donald Fagen is back on the scene with a nice CD, KAMAKIRIAD (Reprise Records) True, Fagen is most renowned for the Steely Dan days, but this dude has always been coated with a Jazzy, Soulful flavor even during those years with SD. Those who have been into just plain good music can tell you that Donald Fagen has always

delivered his material in the Jazz vein. (Check out the Nightfly, Fagens first solo project). The long awaited Alex Bugnon LP is out. "This Time Around" serves up a bit of cross-over appeal in the way of Rap. Case in point is the first track on the disc called "Klook Mop" featuring the rapping of The Vibe Tribe. Track two, "Sweet Sticky Thing," an Ohio Players cover, will do very well in the Quiet Storm or perhaps the mainstream. Have you noticed lately how alot of groups are redoing great songs of yesterday?...Hmm!! Some folks are doing these remakes justice, but others...I don't knowww! Okay back to it!! Atlantic Jazz's fantastic five, Straight Ahead, are back with their latest, "Body and Soul," a rare all female group that plays some serious jazz: ten smashing cuts produced by Lenny White. You know this has to be tough. Remember Pieces of a Dream? They are back, literally bigger and better than before. The guys expanded the group to seven members, dishing out some good stuff that will satisfy various listening appetites.

Here's the rest of the lot; Rippingtons, "Live in LA" (GRP), Don Grusin; "Nativeland" (GRP) Sergio Salvatore (GRP), Dave Koz; "Lucky Man" (Capitol), Bob Berg; "Enter The Spirit" (Stretch Records), Eddie Gomez; "Next Future" (Stretch), Willie and Lobo' "Gypsy Boogaloo" (Mesa).
