> North Las Vegas, Las Vegas and Clark County now share the

cost of providing fire alarm related services, which are dispatched from the City of Las Vegas' Fire Department Communications Center. The response system currently in use is about 15-years-old and is obsolete. Due to the age of the system, basic hardware and parts are no longer available. As a result, some North Las Vegas fire units do not possess working vehicle status systems, which would make it easier to dispatch available units when needed.

Council approved donating the North Las Vegas Police Department's old 9-1-1 telephone emergency response system to Boulder City. North Las Vegas recently purchased new 9-1-1 equipment and the older system is no longer in use.

## PROJECT DEDICATION SET FOR JUNE 28

The City Hall Art Project "Ground Zero" will be formally dedicated by the Arts Commission in a ceremony set for 8 p.m. on June 28 at the project site. The dedication and official lighting, open to the public, will be followed by a reception for the Arts Commission members and invited guests at the Nevada Institute for Contemporary Art.

To prepare for the ceremony, artist and project creator Bill Maxwell asked arts commissioners to leave the project "dark" until the official lighting, and commission members have concurred. "This is very much in keeping with the opening of any project or performance. By leaving the 'stage' dark, the impact comes from raising the curtain, or in this case, lighting the project," said Steve Carr, chairman of the Arts Commission.

Carr added that while citizens have seen portions of the lighting during early test periods, the project that is unveiled on June 28 will incorporate all of the artist's fine tuning. "Mr. Maxwell is a nationally renowned artist who puts tremendous care into each and every piece he creates. He has been very particular about the final details of the project, but he looks forward to the impact his completed piece will have on those who come to view it."
