Amidst recent threats on the life of 13 year old African-American, Eric Gaines, by members of the Neo Nazi Party residing in the Sunrise Mountain area, David Gaines, father of the threatened youth and Ron Current, President of the Black Panther Party, decided to take action on Saturday, June 26, 1993

at noon at the Sunrise Recreation

Gaines said that while his son was leaving a convenience store in the neighborhood, a white youth told him that 'We are going to kill you nigger!' Responding seriously to this threat, Gaines immediately informed Sergeant Lucas, Area Commander in the Sunrise Moun-

youth that made the threat was not one of the original eight youths that confronted him before.

THE TRUTH SHALL SET YOU FREE

Ron Current, of the Black Panther Party, was called and he responded by calling Metro and suggesting that a peaceful confrontation be set up on Saturday.

Current told the Sentinel-Voice that the Metropolitan Police Department official that he spoke to agreed that it was a good idea and stated that Current and the party had his total support.

It turned out that Gaines, a retired security officer, felt that it would not be safe, drawing off his insight and hindsight of these types of matters in his home state of New York. When Current and eight other party members arrived at Gaines' residence to car pool to the center, there were 3 metro squad cars and one unmarked car in the residential neighborhood. Gaines said that there
