Matthew Weathersby, a veteran police officer turned amateur historian, recently traded in his police car and badge for a horse and saber. Weathersby's transformation from a 1990's police officer to an 1890's buffalo soldier was designed to introduce the second volume in what will ultimately be a seven-volume series of baseballtype trading cards entitled "On Black America."

First introduced in 1992 by Weathersby and his family, the "On Black America" card series presents American history from a black perspective. Each volume contains 34 fact-filled photo cards that are similar in size and appearance to the ever-popular baseball card.

According to Weathersby, many Americans are unaware of the contributions made to this country's history by African-Americans. With his cards, Weathersby presents these historic contributions in a challenging, yet easy-to-read form.

Weathersby believes that the real value in the cards is the positive effect they have on the self esteem of young African-American children. "You should see the smiles on the faces of young children when they learn that their ancestors were with George Washington on his historic crossing of the Delaware River, guided the Lewis and Clark expedition, reached the North Pole and even rode the dusty trails in the old west. "The newly released Volume II, which is entitled "They Fought For America," looks at the African-American soldier from the Revolutionary War to Operation Desert Storm. Cards in this volume include the legendary Buffalo Soldiers, the Tuskegee Airmen (America's first Black combat pilots) and Dorie Miller, the World War II navy messman who shot down four enemy planes during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor.
