AT LEGENDS ARE MADE OF H GEORGE BENS

Critics, jazz connoisseurs and fans believe that guitarist/ vocalist George Benson is indeed a cut above all the rest as an individual and artist. Playing and performing for more than 4 decades, George Benson has just recently released his latest smash contribution to the music world, "Love Remembers".

Being a young man in my twenties, and dancing to The Trammp's "disco" music, I was and printurned on to the mature sound of George Benson's "Breezin" by my cousin Vincent. And ever since then it's been smooth sailing with the Pittsburgh native.

Just before George was leaving the country to promote his latest project, I had the op-

portunity to speak with him and learn who he is, what kind of person he is and what he thinks about the music

This is his first project in nearly four years, and it is already doing well on the charts and in the record stores. George explains that he didn't want to just throw something together and put it in the stores, understanding that several artists have become commercialized. He is a person with class and integrity and has a full appreciation for his listening audience, which is still growing rapidly. With an arsenal of songs that can heard daily on a variety of radio station formats, George Benson displays a knowledgeable sense for what the listeners want without compromising his unlimited

George, who also wrote and produced several cuts on "Love Remembers" collaborated with his son, keyboardest, Steven Benson on "Come Into My World". He finds it easy to put together a congenial pool of talent, such as Randy Becker, Bob James, Hubert Laws, Paulinho da Costa and Kirk Whalum, just to name a few, who are ready to put their best foot forward. With contributions from three highly respected and sort after producers, David Gamson ("I'll Be Good To You"), Stewart Levine ("Calling You") and Bob James ("Somewhere Island", "Willing To Fight", "Love Remebers", "My Heart Is Dancing"), it's not hard to believe this soft spoken man is "hyped" about this CD.

Always the student, George studied the styles and formats of such musical greats as, Wes Montgeomery, Grant Green, Kenny Burrell and Jim Hall, as well as a host of others. Not yet feeling that he has reached his full GOD-given potential, George admits that, "music is bigger than all of us, jazz has grown and artists have been given the chance to venture out". He also feels that "what we do in music is what we do in our everyday life", so he continues to explore the world for new dimensions in his

The Benson sound consists of a variety of songs that deal with feelings and emotions that take place in everyday people's lives. In his melodies, he understands how his music touches the heart of the romanticist, the harmony of a happy person and the reflection of the positive side of life. George personally says he doesn't deal with anything negative. He even finds it humorous when he hears people say, "whenever you are in need of some uplifting, all you got to do is put on a George Benson

'AMERICA BETTER WAKE UP IF IT WANTS AMERICA MUCH LONGER,' DIRECTOR OF I

vsta liita nNew York at "if America mother who gave us a strong wants to be America for much longer, it better start waking up," stressed 21-year-old Allen Hughes, the highly acclaimed co-director of the powerful new movie, "Menace II Society," about Los Angeles gangs.

In an interview with this Sunday's PARADE magazine, Allen, who directed the movie with his twin brother Albert, said he hopes good will come from the cycle of violence demonstrated by the movie.

"You're supposed to get an understanding of how an environment can cause a perfectly good-hearted kid to become a criminal," Allen said, blaming the violence among black teenagers on neglect by the parents and society and the lack of jobs and education.

"I know life isn't fair," he commented. "But when life isn't fair to a group of people for 400 years...Look, we see ourselves as human beings, not as persons of a certain color. But when you walk down the street, you're reminded of who you are and what you are."

Explaining how he and his brother escaped from the cycle of violence around them growing up in "one of the worst parts of Detroit," Allen said, "We had things to do. We had a good

sense of values. She gave us things to keep us busy - she gave us a video camera when we were 12, when she was two years out of the welfare program.

"People need to get together," he added. "I know it's our job to do something about it as well as everybody else's, but it's everybody's job to come to the table to understand how things started, the neglect, everything."
