

He's Grrreat!!! ELDRICK "TIGER" WOODS CAPTURES THIRD U.S. JUNIOR AMATEUR TITLE



His name may not be Tony, but they share the same nickname, and can lay claim to the word *Grrreat!!!*

Eldrick "Tiger" Woods, 17, became the first first male junior golfer to win two consecutive U.S. Junior Amateur titles in

1992. This past Saturday, he completed the hat trick.

At Waverly Country Club, in Portland, Ore., Woods captured his third straight junior champi-

onship, defeating Ryan Armour on the first extra hole.

Following a missed putt on Hole 16, Woods was down two shots. An unbelievable finish on

Holes 17 and 18 forced the extra hole, which stunned Armour.

Woods has now won 18 consecutive Junior Amateur matches and is 22-1 in four years.

sports.

Hard work payed off as the Kansas City A's made Jackson the second pick in the 1966 amateur draft and didn't have to spend much time at Class A ball, at Modesta, Calif. Reggie was sent to Double A ball in Birmingham and eventually hit the big leagues toward the end of the '67 season.

When the A's moved to Oakland in 1968, the city experienced the Muhammad Ali of baseball. Jackson was big, aggressive, powerful, quick and definitely loud. His statements were heard everywhere.

"Hitting Nolan Ryan is like eating soup with a fork."

"Between the ages of zero and 14, I was colored. Between 14 and 30 I was a Negro. And between 30 and the present, I'm black."

"I'm the straw that stirs the drink," after going to play for the Yankees in 1977.

Jackson, the #6 all-time home run leader with 563 homers, arguably was the best clutch baseball player of his time. Although his lifetime batting average of .262 is the lowest of any Hall of Fame outfielder, it would be Jackson to turn to in pressure situations.

Mr. Jackson, now 89-years-old, was present at Reggie's August 1st induction, which made the presentation even more special. Until 1987, when Reggie's father took ill, Pops was always able to attend spring training for a couple of weeks.

There are two more days this month, the 14th and the 23rd,

that Reggie will be honored, and Marty will be proud. First, No. 44, Reggie's number, will be retired at Yankee Stadium, then, the latter of the dates will mark the reintroduction of his *Reggie!* candy bar.

Reggie's words last Sunday impressed USA TODAY columnist Hal Bodley enough to write "...still Mr. October, but more than one-high ranking baseball official in his audience got the notion he would make a great commissioner, and this is not a lark."

Atlanta's Bill Bartholomay, head of the search committee, should take Reggie seriously. Call him in for an interview - if you haven't already."

Bodley is right though! When Mr. October speaks of

the sport, he speaks with sincerity, about tradition. The true respect for the game appeared in Reggie's voice.

And while the thought of all the questions about baseball's survival arise, its quick to notice Reggie's point he tried to get across to all the players, owners and executives in the game that baseball will survive but that it was time for them to realize this and begin paying attention.

"Whether you're the Babe, Stan The Man, Say Hey, Mr. October - you're just a part of a long tradition of baseball," said Jackson.

Jackson can be regarded by many Misters - Mr. October, or Mr. Jackson, or even Mr. Commissioner - or, if you like, you may simply call him Reggie!
