NBA WESTERN CONFERENCE PREVIEW

MIDWEST DIVISION

Houston Rockets

"Defense carried us to great heights in 1992-93, and that's the foundation we will start with when camp opens in October." Head Coach Rudy Tomjanovich That is a mighty under-statement when you speak of arguably the best front line in the NBA. The Rockets have a solid wall in Hakeem Olajuwon, Otis Thorpe, and second-year forward Robert Horry. The Rockets' backcourt strengthens with the addition of Sam Cassell, their top draft pick out of Florida State. Kenny Smith found his groove last season, becoming the league's top shooting scoring guard. Rudy T. also has Scott Brooks to fall back on.

The Rockets have seen the NBA Finals since 1986 and will soon have to bring in a solid supporting cast in order for Olajuwon to pave the way. Houston looks like the team to beat in this division, but will need to pick it up when it comes to other Western Conference contenders.

San Antonio Spurs

Although the Spurs look like a team that can compete, you still have to ask yourself questions. Will the injuries to David Robinson affect his performance? According to sources, Robinson's recuperations during the off-season has made him stronger than ever. What about the point guard situation? Plain and simple - Lloyd Daniels. Los Angeles Lakers
