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Sisterlove Women's AIDS Project, founded in Atlanta, Georgia, in 1989, began when a volunteer group of women came together out of concern for the lack of AIDS prevention efforts targeted specifically to women. They saw the void in their communities' AIDS education efforts and thus established Sisterlove to target Atlanta's communities of women with AIDS prevention, education and self-help.

Through it's programs Sisterlove aims to increase the knowledge and practice of preventive health in relation to HIV/ AIDS in communities where women are at risk.

The project has evolved to include an educator's bureau, facilitator training, target outreach, program development assistance, self-help group development, the Sister-to-Sister Women and AIDS Support Network, annual retreats for HIV positive women and "Healthy Love Parties."

Healthy Love Parties are safer sex education workshops

designed to make women feel comfortable and unjudged as they learn about HIV/AIDS infection and prevention, safer sex techniques and self-help to educate and empower participants to change risky behavior.

A practical component gives women the opportunity to discuss facts and fears, sexuality and safety, and to address inhibitions or barriers to practicing preventive sexual behavior.

Yet another time, while I was still a new bride, I baked my husband a cake for his birthday. He took one bite and said it was too heavy. It was years before he got another birthday cake.

l used to write lots of letters to friends across the country. Sometimes as many as 10 to 15

a week. However, I would get a letter once every four or five months. My letter writing has dropped tremendously.

I have four kids and often baby-sit for others. I seldom ask others to baby-sit for me, but every now and then I do need a favor. Once I called up a friend whom I babysat for at least once a week for about a year. This was the first time I'd ever asked her to sit for me and asked if she could watch my kids for about an hour or two. She said, "No, I can't. I'm too tired." I never
