U.S. OLYMPIC TRACK TEAM NAMES CAESARS PALACE DEALER AS MANAGER

Junior guard Jaison McElrov unleashed a barrage of threepointers on Tuesday afternoon, connecting for five treys en route to a 22-point performance, and helped his Western Warriors move within a game of Cimarron-Memorial in the division, by topping the Spartans 90-82.


