NEW SUBSTANCE ABUSE PREVENTION PROGRAM TARGETS PRIME 6 STUDENTS

Students at Prime 6 schools will receive extra assistance in avoiding substance abuse with the help of a new Saturday morning activities program being implemented with a federal grant.

The program, called Project ARTS - Activities to Reduce the Temptation of Substances - officially begins February 19 at all nine Prime 6 schools. It is being funded by a three-year federal grant, at \$390,000 a year, through the Drug Free Schools Act.

Project ARTS focuses on drug information, personal and social responsibility and skill building through hands-on sessions featuring music, dance,

drama and literature. The program will be in effect from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturdays during the school year at each Prime 6 schools. Possible activities include painting a mural or staging a play.

"The goal of the program is to develop resiliency in children," says Andre Long, Project ARTS facilitator. "WE want to empower their parents and the community to provide care and support. We want high expectations for the children, and acknowledgement of them as valued participants in the family, school and community."

each of the Prime 6 schools will be identified to participate, for a total of 270 children. Fourth and fifth graders will be added next year, when those students begin attending Prime 6 schools. Each group of 30 children will be assisted by two teachers, one counselor, one school police officer and two student mentors.

Students in grades six through 10 can receive a boost in career awareness and curriculum planning at the first-ever Futures Expo '94, which will be held February 23 and 24.

The event will be held from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. both days at Cashman Field. Admission is free. The first 500 students each day will receive a free T-shirt.

Unlike a college fair or job fair, the expo will feature businesses from around the Las Vegas Valley who will share with students and their parents how classes today will have an impact on employability tomorrow.

Approximately 100 businesses representing a variety of fields will participate. They will emphasize how education is directly necessary for jobs within the their industry.

"Our goal is to show students who will be entering the work force after high school, as well as those pursuing higher education, how their classes will affect future employability or college acceptance," said Len Paul, assistant superintendent of the CCSD Secondary Education Division. "We want to show them why a bank teller or pole lineman must have math and language

arts skills. This, along with our current effort to link curriculum with careers, should have a positive impact on our students."

The idea for the expo originated with School Board Trustee Judy Witt, and First Interstate Bank and Nevada Power Company helped bring the program to fruition along with the district. "This is an opportunity for us as a business to do something that will provide for the future of our community," said Larry Moulton, FIB branch manager. "If one student stays in school, it will help us and all Las Vegas."
