Just in time for Black History Month (February), The Right Stuff, the new label under EMI Music's CEMA Special Markets division, will release Movin' On Up, a compilation of songs that chronicle the significant role of music in the civil rights movement. Release date is set for February 8th.

The most prolific musical contributors to the cause are represented on the album: Nina Simone ("Mississippi Gaddamn," "Why"), Curtis Mayfield/ the Impressions ("Keep On Pushing," "Move On Up," "We're A Winner") and James Brown ("Say It Loud," "I Don't Want Nobody To Give Me Nothing". Also included are one track apiece by Otis Redding, Sly & the Family Stone, Stevie Wonder, Donny Hathaway, Aretha Franklin, and The Staple

The mind behind Movin' On Up's concept, compilation and liner notes is that of journalist/ musicologist David Nathan, U.S., editor of Blues & Soul magazine and regular contributing writer to Billboard, as well as author of over 40 album liner

The fruition of an idea he had eight years ago. Nathan writes in his liner notes. "The civil rights movement of the 60's brought about fundamental changes in the very fabric of American life. While leaders such as Dr. Martin Luther King spurred people into action with marches and sit-ins, especially in the South, the music of that era also inspired, uplifted and empowered African-Americans everywhere."

He continues: "While certain songs had a very focused, important and clear-cut message (such as 'Mississippi Gaddamn,' 'Say It Loud,' 'To Be Young, Gifted & Black'), others ('Move It Up,' 'Stand!' and 'Keep On Pushing') speak to the conditions and concerns of all human beings in their desire to live with equal opportunity, regardless of race, color, creed, religion, sex, or sexual orientation. That so many of those issues remain as relevant in the '90's as they were in the 60's makes Movin' On Up a timeless collection of great material by some of the most important figures in contemporary music."

The Right Stuff will also release in February reissues by R&B legends Al Green and Ann Peebles, and an anthology of R&B ballads known as Slow Jams.
