Armon Gilliam, in his first season with the New Jersey Nets, is enjoying one of the most productive seasons in his sevenyear NBA career.

The second player chosen in the 1987 Draft by the Phoenix Suns, Gilliam has put up solid numbers throughout his career, averaging 15.6 points and 7.5 rebounds per game. Nevertheless, he has switched teams three times in search of the proper fit.

After making the 1988 NBA All-Star team while in Phoenix, he was traded to Charlotte in December of '89, and then to Philadelphia in January of '91, before signing with New Jersey as a free agent last summer.

"I thought in New Jersey I had the best opportunity to win," said Gilliam, referring to the Nets' one-two punch of All-Star starters forward Derrick Coleman and guard Kenny Anderson. "I thought New Jersey had this nucleus together and I'd come in and complement the nucleus."

Though the Nets (15-20) have struggled this season, the 6-9, 245 pound Gilliam has been

a valuable addition. Used almost exclusively as a reserve by Coach Chuck Daly, he has logged minutes at all three frontcourt positions.

Gilliam is the Nets' key player off the bench, averaging 12.7 ppg and 6.4 rpg while shooting at a .506 clip, all figures rate rank among the team leaders. He has topped the team in scoring five times and in rebounding on five occasions. Although the losses have been more frequent then he had hoped, Gilliam is satisfied with his role of the Nets.

"Scoring and rebounding, those are my two main areas. That's something I can give to this team," said Gilliam. "That's' something I've been doing for a long time and I'm very comfortable doing it. I can come in and play the 'three,' 'four' and 'five'. I don't really mind."


Said Daly, With the loss of Chris Dudley (who left New Jersey for Portland as a free agent),


we thought we needed to shore up offensively and get some back-up help. Armon has provided that. He's done a nice job. He's a professional player with a pro attitude."


Despite posting some impressive wins against Eastern Conference clubs this season (home wins over Charlotte, Atlanta and New York, road wins at New York and Boston), the Nets have still struggled with consistency, and their road back to the Playoffs will be a tough one

"There's a lot of season left. We have been in a lot of close ballgames that could have gone either way," he noted. "We have a lot of talent. It comes down to making the right decisions down the stretch of games."

Having signed a five-year contract, the 29-year-old former UNLV standout hopes to finally find his niche and end his career with the Nets.


