cussed for parents who do not pay child support, which according to the President, accounts for 34-billion dollars in federal subsidies. He suggested garnishing paychecks, a national tracking network for delinquent parents, seizure of tax refunds, and suspension of driving privileges. Quality education was also placed upon the President's agenda. Clinton alluded to education vouchers and privatization as an option to parents in selecting their child's school. The voucher system narrowly lost support during an referendum in California in late 1993. The system would give parents the option to use payment vouchers to select the school which their child would

The President could not, however, resist the temptation to market his health care package to a captive joint session of Congress. Substantial play was given to his package as the President warned Republicans that he would not support any counter proposal which did not have universal coverage for all Americans. The package faces tough scrutiny by Congress. Republicans have criticized the President's plan as being unrealistic and too costly.






