The President said an executive order that he signed recently would commit the administration to aiding the progress of historically black colleges and universities.

Proposals for such aid have included putting more money into programs like Upward Bound, guaranteeing a new Historically Black Colleges and Universities Capital Financing Program of \$375 million, increasing funding for Pell Grants, and a new college loan system.

"People never get discouraged from borrowing money to go to college because of the burden of repaying it," the President said. "Now they can elect to

pay it back as a percentage of their income over a long period of time."


President Clinton also took note of the effort of UNCF and the Hispanic Association of Higher Education to provide opportunities for international aid programs to historically black

He ended his speech by saying,"If learning is the key to full freedom in America, it must necessarily be true also that people must be free to learn."


