

Beginning this fall, UNLV will offer a master's degree in criminal justice.

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The two-year master of arts program will prepare students to pursue careers in criminal justice research, policy-making, administration, and teaching. It will also prepare them to pursue doctoral degrees in criminal justice or in other social or behavioral sciences.

"It's a program that emphasizes an understanding of causes of crime and of factors that influence the development and implementation of laws to deal with crime," said criminal justice professor Ronald Farrell, director of the graduate program.

"An understanding of these issues in essential to sound social policy in criminal justice," he said. The program will place a strong emphasis on criminal justice theory and on research methods," he added.

"There's a great need for such a program in Las Vegas," Farrell said. "This is a growing community and, like many other urban areas, it faces growing concerns about crime control.

Applications for admission for the fall semester are due July 1. One of the requirements for admission is a 3.0 grade point average. Farrell said he expects that most successful applicants will have undergraduate degrees in one of the social or behavioral sciences or in public administration.
