"She wanted me to tell everyone that 'we must always strive to work out the differences that we encounter with one another'." State Senator Lori Lipman-Brown delivered a speech which aimed at unity. Brown credited ACLU in its endeavors to unify and protect the rights of the less fortunate. As a freshman senator, Brown made an immediate impact in the field of human rights. She is credited with repealing Nevada's long-standing sodomy law, which prohibited homosexual acts among consenting adults. Her interests in SIIS and consumer protection earned her high credits from her fellow senators.

An awkward point in the afternoon's festivities came when Community Peace Chairman, Elgin Simpson, delivered his acceptance speech. Simpson began his oratory with the statement: "some of you aren't going to like what I'm going to say."


