## The LAS VEGAS SENTINEL-VOICE June 2, 1994 WITH ROBINSON, HILL AND KIDD ATOP THE LIST, **MILWAUKEE BUCKS SHOULD BE LICKING THEIR CHOPS**

Glenn Robinson, the nation's leading scorer and the consensus college Player of the Year last season; Jason Kidd, the Pac-10 Conference Player of the Year who led the country in assists; and, Grant Hill the phototype small forward that can handle the rock in the point guard spot head a list of NBA Draft candidates which the Milwaukee Bucks should be drooling over.

Bucks Head Coach Mike Dunleavy knew when he returned as head coach and vicepresident of the club, that a complete rebuilding job was in order. Now, just over two years later, Dunleavy and Milwaukee can begin their quest when they make the first selection in the NBA Draft on June 29 at the Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis.

"I think it's going to have a great impact on us," said Dunleavy. "I think we're either going to get a great player at No. 1 or we're going to have the ability to explore every avenue to make our team better, and that could

mean a trade of some kind." Milwaukee will also get the 18th pick in the first round of the draft.

The Dallas Mavericks ended up with the second draft pick, and like the Bucks, will have two first-round picks, Nos. 2 and 19. Already one season into a

slightly new era, after drafting a string of young players, the Detroit Pistons will continue their rebuilding phase following the retirements of Isiah Thomas and Bill Laimbeer with the third selection.

"Coming up with one of the top three in the Draft will give us a marquee player," said Pistons' Director of Personnel Billy McKinney. "That is great, as we are in the rebuilding stage of our team.

Robinson and Kidd headline the list of early entry candidates, which also includes: Michigan standouts Juwan Howard and Jalen Rose; consensus first team All-America forward/center Donyell Marshall of Connecticut; All-America forward/center Clifford Rozier of Louisville; and

Pac-10 scoring leader Lamond Murray of California.

Robinson may be able to add a force to the NBA such as Larry Johnson did in 1991 when the Charlotte Homets made him the top choice out of UNLV. "Big Dog" Robinson averaged 30.3 ppg., and 10.1 rpg., as a junior, leading the nation in scoring and



he's had only two years experience in college. A Prop 48 casualty, Robinson was fortunate to have Cuonzo Martin accent the frontcourt at Purdue this past season and may need that same support in the pros.

Kidd became California's first-ever Pac-10 player of the Year as a sophomore, averaging 16.7 ppg., 9.1 assists per game and 3.1 steals per game. The talented guard also managed close to seven (6.9) rebounds per game. His greatest asset is his tenacity, especially on defense. If he hones in on his jump shot on the NBA hardwood he will be a gem for any rebuilding squad, such as the Pistons. Detroit, which is already loaded with young talent at the guard position, could use someone like Kidd to bring back the relentlessness that once graced The

Palace of Auburn Hills. Thrown into the mess of hardship, is four-year collegiate star Hill, who has patiently waited his turn at the NBA Draft. Hill was the only key remaining from the drama of the Blue Devils' two-year title run when they returned to the championship game this past season against Arkansas. He is arguably the most versatile player available for the draft and could easily become the quickest star. He is dynamic when operating from the wing, and if he is at the point, he'll be able to see over a majority of any point guard assigned to him. He is able to handle the rock, dish inside, drive the lane and dish back out, or basically just slash to the basket for a quick deuce. He is already drawing comparison to Chicago Bulls star Scottie Pippen.

The Knicks will need to win Game 6 Friday evening at Market Square Arena, in Indianapolis, where the Pacers haven't been beaten in the 1994 Playoffs yet. The win would force a Game 7 back at Madison Square Garden on Sunday, June 5.

If the series does happen to make it to seven, the Knicks better not hope 1973 comes into play, otherwise it'll be the visiting team left standing.
