Vancouver is decidedly a worldly city, with a mosaic of international cultures. The most outstanding example of this culture blend is Chinatown. Many of the buildings in Chinatown date to the 1880's and are architecturally unique outside China. Thanks in part to the recent influx of immigrants from Hong Kong, this area is really bustling now, and a high quality of oriental cuisine.

Experience Gastown, in the late 1800s it was the center of Vancouver with many layers of gracious stone and brick buildings. These buildings were so solidly constructed that a great number of them have survived, finding new life as elegant restaurants and boutiques.

Most visitors are drawn to a less historic, but equally colorful area, Granville Island was once an industrial site. Now consid-

erably spruced up, it maintains the original timber-beam and tin-roof structures. A very popular farmers' market, artist studios, sailboat chandlers and the unusual shops and businesses.

Museum lovers will be glad to discover that Vancouver's extensive museum complex is conveniently located near Granville Island. The complex includes the superb Vancouver Museum, the U.R. MacMillan Planetarium and The Maritime Museum, which houses the St. Rock, the Romp Vessil that was the first ship to navigate the Northwest passage in both directions. The museum of anthropology at the University of British Columbia was built on a hilltop overlooking the Strait of Georgia. The museum's design was inspired by the magnificent long houses of the costal Indians. Inside the great hall is one of the world's finest collections of Northwest coast Indian totem

poles and art work.
