Menza came to Las Vegas in 1989 at the invitation of Frank Gagliardi, director of the awardwinning UNLV Jazz Ensemble. As artist-in-residence at UNLV, he spent the next year working with the ensemble, and also contributed arrangements to it's library. His presence was a major factorin the excellence achieved

by the 1990 band, which took first place that year in the Music Fest USA competition for college jazz bands. The ensemble's CD, "Caliente, Muy Caliente," received the highest 5-starrating in prestigious Downbeat magazine, an unprecedented achievement for a college ensemble.

Vibist-drummerpercussionist Joe Locatelli will head a six-piece group playing swinging latin-jazz in the Cal Tjader tradition. A drummer in numerous Las Vegas house bands since 1963, the popular Locatelli has worked with many top jazz performers, and has Queens' Monday Night Jazz.

The New Orleans Jazz Band is led by trombone virtuoso Jim Huntzinger, who recently appeared as guest soloist with the Nevada Jazz Orchestra. Specializing in traditional ("tred" for short) or Dixieland style jazz, the band, consisting of three horns plus a three-man rhythm section, plays authentic versions of classics like "Muskrat Ramble," and "Rampart Street Parade." When shopping look for jewelry made from local minerals, and indigenous arts and crafts. Visitors who want to be cowboys can find top-grade western wear.

You will want at least two nights in Banff, a mountain resort town about an hour's drive west of Calgary, but if you fall in love with the Rockies you might want to linger a few days more.

Visit Banff National Park, Canada's most popular national park. It is noted for it's natural beauty and it's recreational and cultural offerings throughout the year. Observe snow-capped mountains in every direction, evergreen forests, streams, lakes and rivers which characterize the park. Wildlife that is easily seen from the main roads includes: bighord sheep, elk, deer and a little more luck is needed to locate grizzly bears, moose and coyotes. The park is heaven for photographers, who take advantage of the constantly changing weather and light which can produce stunning effects.

While in Banff, plan a 1/2 day trip to walk around nearby Lake Louise. The Lake Louise Ski Area is Canada's largest and most spectacular. Enjoy a view of one of the world's most beautiful glacial lakes.

After a day on the trails or the slopes, relax in the therapeutic

waters at Upper Hot Springs or the warm spring-fed pool at the Cave and Basin Centennial

Visit Cypress Hills Provincial Park in southern Alberta, an oasis in the prairie. A pretty area of small lakes, streams and green hills that offers fishing, boating, camping and hiking. Wildlife includes: 200 species of birds as well as deer, elk, moose and beavers.

Due to it's size, Alberta experiences a variety of climatic conditions. Those interested in other than winter sports will find

midsummer to early fall the best time to visit. Alberta boast the title of Canada's sunniest province, with more clear days than anywhere else in Canada.

TRAVEL TIPS:

Clothing: Layers of clothing that can be added or taken off as conditions warrant will ensure comfort. It can get cold so it's best to be prepared.
