No question about it, Green Valley has lived up to their preseason billing as the Southern Conference's team to beat. With only three weeks left in the regular season, the Gators (4-0 in the Sunrise Division and 6-0 overall) have a considerably soft schedule left before vying for the Zone championship. The Gators will host Las Vegas High this Friday, and then finish their season on the road - at Valley and Boulder City. An upset by Valley would not be out of the ordinary, as the Vikings have had a surprisingly decent year under first-year coach Greg Murphy.

"Valley has been the biggest surprise," says Eldorado Head Coach Jimmy May. "Murphy has done a great job with those kids over there."

May's biggest concern isn't the Vikings though, it's getting by cellar dwellers Chaparral and Basic the next two weeks. May is hoping that his Sundevils (3-1, 4-2) aren't looking ahead to the final game of the season, against longtime-rival Rancho.

"Right now we want to concentrate on winning the next two," admits May. "Then we can worry about Rancho and playing for the second playoff berth. If we start looking ahead, we run the chance of being upset."

When the 'Devils and Rancho square off on October 28, it'll be a big game in a number of ways. First, and most importantly, it should decide which Sunrise Division team will proceed to the Zone playoffs to face the Sunset's top-ranked squad. Second, it will endure a great rivalry that has been a part of Nevada's Southern Conference prep football for a long time. Third, it'll be a matchup for Rancho Head Coach Cary Mitchell, that may never be forgotten. Mitchell spent the majority of his prep coaching career at Eldorado before moving to Rancho.

May says there is much respect on his part for Coach Mitchell, and knows that it is "Cary that did a great job in bringing a winning tradition to Eldorado."

And how would Coach Mitchell feel if he were to advance to the playoffs by winning that game?

"When it gets to that point, ask me then," he simply stated.

Rancho will face a tough test this Friday when they travel to Valley High for a meeting with the Vikings. Then, one week before hosting Eldog, they'll travel to Las Vegas for yet another tough game. The two play every year for Sir Herkimer's Bone.

"Some of the kids are already talking about (Eldorado) and the bone game at Vegas," admits Mitchell, "...but we still have to get by Valley. They're focused day-by-day, but there are still the general distractions."

Mitchell says he is mostly worried about his special teams unit, which has missed its last seven extra points.

"I'm not worried about injuries as much as before. We haven't executed our special teams and we have to come through when the opportunity

At the beginning of the football season, local prep football coaches and critics said that Western would be the team to beat in the Sunset Division. With only three weeks remaining though, it is the Cheyenne Desert Shield (3-0 in Sunset Division play and 5-0 overall) that is sitting atop the standings. According to both school's head coaches - Western's Joe Blockovich and Cheyenne's George Perry - it is just the way they expected it.

When asked if he imagined his team would be undefeated at this point, Perry simply responded, "Yes!"

Although Green Valley Head Larry Thomas says his squad "is in excellent shape," there are some things they'll be working on the last three weeks.


