AFRICAN-AMERICAN HISTORY DR. MARGARET BURROUGHS, Founder of Dusable Museum

Dr. Burroughs was born in St. Rose, LA and later moved to Chicago. Ms. Burroughs attended public schools and went on to graduate from Chicago Normal College as a teacher in Art and Humanities. She earned her B.A. and M.A. degrees in Art Education at the Art Institute of Chicago. Dr. Burroughs also taught in the public schools and art at Dusable High. She later founded the Southside Community Art Center in 1940.

In 1945 she started the "Negro History Museum" in her apartment. In 1961, she and her husband Charles needed more space, so in a larger home they opened the "Ebony Museum of Negro History and Art." By 1972 more space was needed so they sought an unused building in Washington Park. They raised money to renovate the building and "The Dusable Museum of African-American History" was born.

Dr. Burroughs is also a sculptor, painter, writer, poet and art collector.
