

# FIRST INTERSTATE DONATES TO HALLOWEEN SLAYING SECRET WITNESS FUND

First Interstate Bank of Nevada announced recently that it is donating \$1,500 to the Secret Witness fund established after 7-year-old Tony Bagley was slain and his sister, mother and aunt were wounded by gunfire during their celebration of Halloween.

"The nature of this crime is especially upsetting and we hope that the Secret Witness fund will provide an added incentive for citizens to provide authorities with the information needed to

apprehend the suspects," said Tom Mangione, southern Nevada area manager for the bank. "We urge companies to

make donations to the Secret Witness fund so that law enforcement authorities can close this case as quickly as

possible." Mangione said First Interstate will continue to work with state Sen. Joe Neal,

Assemblyman Morse Arberry and other community leaders who are working to resolve the case.

## CITY OF LAS VEGAS MUNICIPAL COURT PLACES MORATORIUM ON TRAFFIC WARRANTS

Presiding judge Seymore H. Brown has announced that motorists who have failed to initially appear in court on traffic citations, and who have had warrants issued for their arrest as a result, will be given a chance to pay reduced fines and have their case closed during a court imposed moratorium. The program is held annually, with this year's moratorium beginning on Monday, November 14 and ending on December 31, 1994.

To participate in the moratorium, individuals must first come to the front counter of the Municipal Court in City Hall during regular hours (Monday through Friday, 7a.m. to 8p.m.) to schedule a court appearance date. At that time, participants will be able to schedule appointments for special court sessions to be held on all Saturdays in the month of December.

To avoid confusion with the recent AMNESTY WEEK on parking tickets held by the City of Las Vegas, Judge Brown emphasized that this is a Moratorium On Traffic Warrants on traffic tickets only, not an amnesty period.

Judge Brown stated that an average of 5,000 warrants are issued monthly, and there are several thousand outstanding warrants...some have been in the system for three years. All traffic warrants currently in the court's computer can be paid during the moratorium. Additionally, all operations of the court will be open so people can also pay other fines, sign up for traffic school, or conduct other court business.

"We don't want people going to jail over the holidays," Judge Brown stated. "However, if people fail to come during this grace period, I guarantee that the Marshal's Office will be out in force on January 2, 1995, arresting those people who don't take advantage of this opportunity."
