I don't know when it happened, but one day I woke up to realize that I was in control of my life. Not my boss, not my teachers, my parents, my spouse, my friends, my children ... no one but me. I realized that any happiness, any self-satisfaction, any accomplishments, any joy, or any sadness that came into my life, I was in control of. In that case, there are no excuses for me. the combined effect of the two antibodies, Vaarala says,"is additive, which means that the antibodies contribute to the development of coronary thrombosis in different ways."

Phospholipids, targets of the aCL anitbodies' attack, are a form of lipid (fat) found in the membranes of every cell in the body. Theoretically, these antibodies can cause widespread damage to the body's own tissues.

"Phosholipids are important factors in blood coagulation, and antibodies directed against phospholipids may thus interfere with coagulation and contribute to episodes of clotting," the scientist explains.

"We conclude that immunological factors are important in development of heart attacks," says Vaarala. Evidence from previous studies suggests that strokes, sometimes called brain attacks, may also sometimes be due to an " autoimmune" disorder, a misguided attack of the body on itself.

Heart attack and stroke rank as the first and

third largest causes of death in America, according to the AHA.

"Right now, we don't know what to do if you have high levels of anti-cardiolipin antibobies," admits Vaarala." This is a new finding and in the future it may lead to new tests dand new treatments." Currently the researchers are studying the antibodies in more detail, trying to determine if they bind to and interfere with a molecule that prevents blood clotting

Over a decade ago, scientists first became aware of aCL antibodies when they were discovered in the blood of patients with the autoimmune disease SLE (systemic lupus erythematosus). SLE victims often have recurrent episodes of clotting, hardening of the arteries and heart attacks.

Vaarala's co-authors are Matti Manttari, Vesa Manninen, Leena Tenkanen, Marja Puurunen, Kimmo Aho and Timo Palusuo.

Circulation is one of five scientific journals published by the Dallas-based AHA.
