Hopkins' undefeated team (17-0 overall and 6-0 in division play) has one player that could be a legitimate Division I prospect in senior guard Michael Johnson.

Since he was a freshman, Hopkins has taken Johnson

under his wing, attempting to mold him into a rising basketball star. He joined the junior varsity squad as a sophomore to gain a bit more experience, but stepped up big as a junior.

Now, he is attracting junior colleges and Division I attention. Johnson, with his mother

Marie, lives in North Las Vegas and has spent the majority of his life on either the Westside or North Las Vegas.

"Michael is a unique individual," says Hopkins "and because he wears his hair a little bit different from everybody else or he wears his clothes a certain way,

"(Mike) knows he has an opportunity to continue his education through athletics," says Hopkins. "I think that is the thing that is motivating him the most right now.

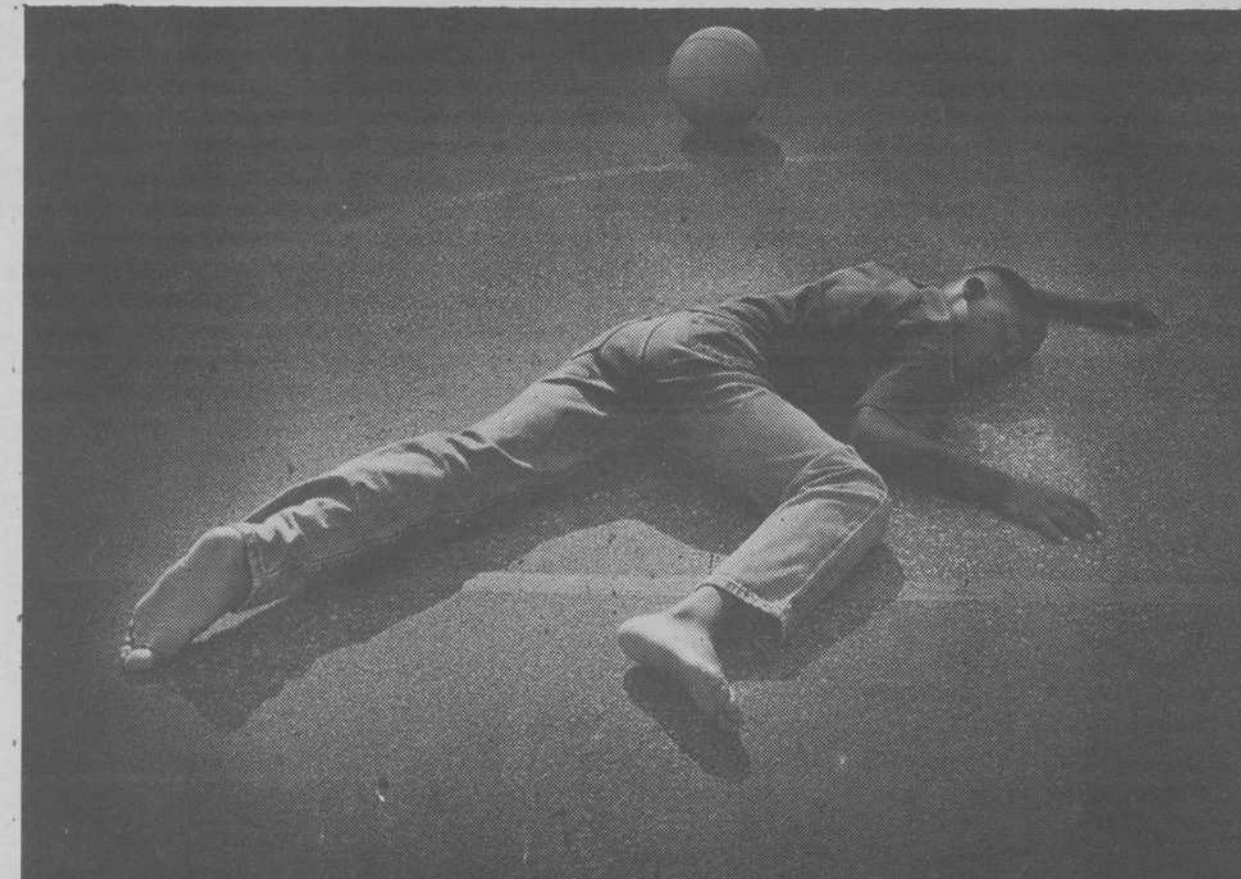
"Because he's had some problems academically, the route he's more likely gonna have to take is through a junior
