As an increasingly influential caucus within the Democratic party, the party which controlled Congress for almost 50 years, the Congressional Black Caucus (CBC) was the voice of a Black Agenda in government. The Democrats had the majority. And the CBC had leverage within that majority to influence the party to support government policy favorable to (or, in some cases, not hurtful to) African Americans. The members of the CBC (along with other Black elected officials) had the political

job of mobilizing Black voters to support Democratic Party candidates. That was the source of its leverage inside the Democratic Party, which in turn shaped the legislative agenda of the country. But when the Democratic Party lost its majority on Election Day, 1994, the CBC's role as the voice of a Black Agenda in government was substantially muted.

And that is where the trouble lies. The Democrats, as you would expect, are trying to figure out how to retake Congress from the Republicans. President Clinton and the Democratic Leadership Council had decided that the Democratic Party must continue to reach out to white, moderate middle class voters who have shifted to the Republican Party (or supported Ross Perot) and downplay its historical association with the Black community in order to reconstitute its majority.

In a recently published book, Middle Class Dreams, author

Stanley Greenberg, Clinton's pollster in the 1992 campaign and an influential strategist in the reconstitution of a Democratic Party majority, presents a 300-page blueprint for the Democrats' comeback; only four paragraphs deal with the role of the Black community. The latest of these are the Democratic Party-sponsored welfare reform packages, which are harsh and punitive to welfare recipients. Their sponsors justify these proposals on the grounds that unless they are passed an

version might become law. Unfortunately, they are right.

All of this puts the CBC in a bind. During the era of Democratic Party majority rule, the CBC was able to use the Black community's political loyalty to the Democrats to influence government policy. Now, with the Democratic Party increasingly advocating an anti-Black agenda in order to make itself and its candidates electable, Black voters are left without any voice in the system and with no motivation to remain loyal. For the Black community a shift to the Republicans is not a serious option. But as the CBC and other African American elected officials come face to face with the contradiction between leading the Black community in its own interests and keeping the Black community in a no-win relationship to the Democratic Party, a break to a third party
