Secondary Summer School Registration

Registration is under way for secondary summer school classes which will be offered at eight Clark County School District campuses. The first session will begin June 12 and end June 29. The second session will start July 10. Students can earn 1/2 credit during each session. Summer school classes will be held Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 11:40 a.m. at ATTC, Basic, Bonanza, Cimarron-Memorial, Durango, Las Vegas, Rancho, Valley and a West Las Vegas satellite.

Over one hundred years before Min. Malcolm X founded the Organization of <u>Afro</u> American Unity, the term "Afro-American" had been documented in this press. For example, in 1846, Rev. Alexander Crummel used it in *The Ram's Horn*, another popular African American newspaper.

He wrote, "The rising anti-slavery feeling of the north confines itself almost entirely to the interests and rights of the white race, with an almost utter disregard of the Afro-Americans, which tendency is dangerous to and should be changed."

Students of history know that the great Frederick Douglass has a former aide by the name of Martin Delaney, who also founded a weekly newspaper called The *Mystery*. Today, many people are discovering the Harvard educated Delaney, who coined the phrase, "Africa for the Africans" in 1854. This was many decades before the Hon. Marcus Garvey advanced it to an even higher level.

Another example was T. Thomas Fortune (1856-1928), one of the legendary figures of this press. He was affiliated with several newspapers during his lifetime. Among them were the *People's Advocate, The Rumor, The Globe, the New York Freeman and the New York Age.* It was because of Fortune that many newspapers adopted "Afro-American", to replace "Negro".

Did this press always refer to Africa when identifying it's audience, no. Were there other names that were used to describe this readership as well, yes. The point is that Black people in this country, the Caribbean and the world have never stopped being African - and this is now well documented.

Therefore, the next time someone tells you that "African American" is just a passing fad or inaccurate, tell them that you know better because you read the African American press. But, even if "African American" is a passing fad, being "African first" is still the real deal.

High Schools; and Middle School English, Reading, and Math at Cimarron-Memorial and Las Vegas High Schools.
