A lawyer who represented Rodney King in the videotaped beating case has filed suit against him, claiming King failed to pay nearly \$1 million for legal work. Attorney Milton Grimes of Newport Beach also wants \$1.4 million in damages; he says King defamed him in a television news program. Grimes says he and King had an oral agreement that entitled him to one-quarter of any judgment - or \$954,000 - on top of \$456,000 in fees that a federal judge ordered the city to pay directly to Grimes. **BLACK CADET HONORED** POSTHUMOUSLY

Johnson Whittaker, one of the first black cadets at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y. honored posthumously at the White House this week, more than 100 years after he was victim of a racist attack and expelled. President Clinton presented Whittaker's family with his belated commission as an Army second lieutenant and his Bible, seized in 1880 during his court-martial. West Point administrators had accused Whittaker of faking the assault to discredit the academy. Whittaker went on to become a lawyer and college professor before his death in 1931.

NEW YORK (Reuter) - Retired Gen. Colin Powell narrowly leads President Clinton in a head-to-head race for president in 1996, according to a Time magazine/CNN poll released Saturday.

Almost a third of those polled said they would support the retired chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff if he ran as an independent in a three-way race including Republican presidential frontrunner Bob Dole, putting him in a deadheat with the major party candidates, the poll found.

By a 44 to 41 margin, those surveyed supported Powell over Clinton in a twoway race if voting were held on the day of the survey, June 21 to 22. Ten percent of the 1,000 people questioned said they were unsure, and 5 percent said they would not vote.

In a three-way election, Clinton received 33 percent of the vote, compared with Powell's 29 percent and Dole's 27 percent, the poll reported.

A Dole/Powell ticket, however, would has a 3 percent margin of error.

of Clinton and Vice President Al Gore by 47 to 43 percent, the poll reported. Powell



has not clearly indicated if he will run for the presidency or if he is a Republican or Democrat. Powell, appointed by President George Bush in 1989, has kept a high profile in the United States since engineering the U.S. military buildup in the Gulf War.

In the poll, 35 percent said they believe Powell is closer to the Republican Party than to the Democratic Party. Sixteen percent said he was closer to the Democrats, and 44 percent said they were unsure.
