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Colleges and universities are required by law to provide accommodations for students with disabilities. According to N.J. Pettit who works with CCSN's special student populations, the college had difficulty meeting the demand for part-time support employees

to accommodate this focus group because of a 160-hour-per-year wage restriction.

Under new law, service providers can now work up to 1,000 hours a year.

"The Nevada Revised Statutes previously stated that all non-student workers could not exceed 160 hours during one calendar year," Pettit said. "Prior to the passing of this

legislation, our college could not hire enough non-student employees to serve as sign interpreters, test proctors, notetakers, and readers for the visually impaired, to meet demand."

Kim Brown, CCSN's special student advisor, explained that sign language interpreters, for example, are required for all deaf (See College Students, Pg 21)
